



A Message from Interim Editor-in-chief John Skoyles

As many of you know, Ladette Randolph retired as Editor-in-chief on February 1st after 17 years. Her accomplishments are legion. She developed a vibrant website; instituted a writer-friendly Submission Manager; led a rebrand and created the Solos and Longform series; advocated for and created two new full-time positions to ensure our internal success; created a lively blog; and, thanks to your support, reached a \$1.5 million dollar endowment goal.

A lot has happened since then.

Most importantly, a national search concluded successfully with the appointment of Jenny Molberg as our new Editor-in-chief. Jenny has an exceptional portfolio. She has edited *Pleiades: Literature in Context* for the past seven years and has published three books of poems, several of which first appeared in *Ploughshares*. She will join the journal as Editor-in-chief and Emerson College's Writing, Literature and Publishing Department as Professor beginning in August.

I've had the pleasure of serving as interim EIC since Ladette's retirement. As its longtime poetry editor, I was completely at home with the journal, but what I did not expect was the enormous boost in circulation in just a year's time. Over the past twelve months, we've gone from 3,000 to over 5,000 subscribers! And the increase in the volume of submissions is also astounding. We usually receive 1,000 submissions a month, but since we've opened on June 1st, we have over 2,500 submissions in just a few weeks.

None of this could have been possible without you. At a time when the arts are being marginalized, *Ploughshares* continues to thrive thanks to your dedicated support.

Living here in New York, I have met admirers of the magazine at event after event: from Symphony Space, where actors read three stories from the annual O. Henry Awards (two of them from *Ploughshares*), to the Whiting Award ceremony (featuring one



Ploughshares contributor), to a meeting of the National Book Critics Circle. In an interview with LitMag News, I was asked how to account for the journal's longevity. My answer was that in over 54 years, there have been just three editors—DeWitt Henry, Don Lee, and Ladette Randolph—and 108 guest editors representing a variety of disciplines, backgrounds, and tastes. Our hallmark combination of stability and variety has kept Ploughshares interesting; readers are always surprised by the mix of literary stances and the resulting editorial choices in a given issue, but know that no matter what, they can count on finding excellent new work in our pages.

What is so heartening to all of us on staff is to receive enthused responses to our letters of acceptance. The following comes from an emerging writer who appeared in our Spring 2025 issue:

I grew up reading *Ploughshares*. Even before I was old enough to drive, my parents would drop me at bookstores that carried lit mags and I would always sit and read through issues. This is how I knew about Emerson College. I can still remember the awe I felt reading through the issues at that age, wondering how words could be arranged in such a way. Even today, I am amazed at the quality of the work in *Ploughshares*.


I'm sure you are cheered as we are by her words, especially as your financial support is directly responsible for providing the platform for writers like her.
